Each week, students choose one of the papers (if there is a choice) with an asterisk and write a written two-page summary, which they hand in on OLAT at 23.59 each Monday before the lecture. Starting from the second lecture, students will be asked on a random basis to shortly explain their chosen paper to their fellow students in the lecture.

## Content

This course gives a broad overview of the various dimensions of globalization. It starts with discussing the measurement of globalization and then turns to its causes and consequences. Rather than defining globalization according to the narrow economic definition, we take a broad definition, including topics like migration, the spread of institutions, and the role of international organizations.
